## ***Human Beings Do Not Live by Economics Alone – In Search of the European Common Good (Dr. Peter Pavlovic/ Brüssel – Moderation: Dirk Oesselmann)***

The EU is one of the major projects of hope and vision initiated on our continent in the last century. Its vision incorporates a path towards a peaceful and sustainable future based on overcoming divisions through dialogue and cooperation. Since its initiation, the primary driving force for building up the EU has been the achievement of goals that reach beyond economic prosperity. Human, social and natural capital is the precondition for achieving economic objectives. Achievement of economic targets comes often at the expense of human, social and natural capital, and leads to the breakdown of social cohesion. There is a need for reflection about how to make our policies and our politics more humane and compassionate. Faith communities have in this process an important role to play. The session invites to look at the key EU policy package outlining the commitment to achieve climate neutrality by 2050 - the European Green Deal from this perspective.

Dr. Peter Pavlovic, Conference of European Churches & European Christian Environmental Network. His work includes developing dialogue between theology, ethics, and politics. He also focusses on theological perspectives on the economy, ecology, and sustainable development.

## ***The intersectionality of environmental stewardship and social justice: challenges for civil society organisations in the Global South (Abdul Waheed/ Pakistan – Moderation: Ulrich Gödeking, Bread for the World – “Advisor Shrinking Space”)***

Environmental issues and challenges are increasingly affecting the most marginalised and vulnerable communities in the Global South, who often have limited access to resources, information, and decision-making processes. This has led to a growing recognition of the need to address the intersectionality of environmental stewardship and social justice and to promote more equitable and sustainable approaches to development. This topic is timely and relevant and will contribute to a better understanding the complex challenges and opportunities for civil society organisations and youth to promote environmental stewardship and social justice.

Abdul Waheed earned a masters degree in Development, Environment, Society and History of South Asia (MADESH) in September 2022 at the Karl University of Heidelberg. He has over 15 years of work experience in various environmental and development organisations.

## ***Unterdrückung und Befreiungskampf der Guaranis in Bolivien – wie können unterschiedliche Kulturen miteinander leben? (Willma Durán und Hermann Stoffel / Sucre, Bolivien)***

Konkreter Ausgangspunkt für diesen Talk ist eine Forschung über den Befreiungsprozess der versklavten Guarani-Gemeinden aus der Sicht der Beteiligten. Die beiden Referent\*innen geben dazu einen interessanten Einblick, bei dem es sowohl um den Kontext, wie es auch noch in der Aktualität zu versklavenden Lebensbedingungen kommen kann, als auch um den Weg zu einer Gesellschaft geht, die verschiedene ethnische indigene Minderheiten gleichberechtigt anerkennt. Bolivien, welches von 2006-2019 von dem indigenen Präsidenten Evo Morales regiert wurde, bietet dazu eine gute Diskussionsgrundlage.
